# **EDITORIAL**

Dear friends in Christ,

The Labor Day holiday marks a great transition in our society. Schools have begun their academic year. Summer comes to an end,

while autumn lies ahead of us. Vacation activities have concluded. We begin to turn our heads toward Thanksgiving and Christmas. Time passes swiftly.

September is when the new church year begins, and now there's a fresh breeze filling our sails.

Every September I feel the same temptation: to do something fast, fresh, and famous which would draw more people to our church. To impress upon those who are new that this is a place going somewhere, with a really great pastor at its helm. After all, September is for finding a new church. And we want to put our best foot forward, don't we?

To the horror of many type-A, enthusiastic people like me, who prize efficiency and results, discipleship is a slow and often frustrating process. If you don't believe me, track the growth of Jesus' disciples in any of the gospels. While these men have sat under the best preaching ever and experienced God's power and presence in tremendous ways, they were still slow on the uptake. For example, Jesus asks his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" The disciples respond: John the Baptist, Elijah, a prophet... Only one, Peter, gives the right answer. And still, Jesus is patient with them, even when they don't "get it".

# **EDITORIAL (conclusion)**

What should we make of Jesus' patient example? Surely, at minimum, it reminds us of our need to exemplify the kind of patience Jesus showed to others. But, perhaps more deeply, it guards us from turning to superficial tips-and-tricks in our outreach and ministries, just to get results.

In short, a "slow, not fast" approach to ministry addresses the complexity of people's hearts and the various ways in which God's Spirit transforms people. Included in this slow, may not as visible approach: Prayer.

Some of the most important work we can do this September (and every month) won't be on a stage for people to see, but will be done in hidden places. This September, let's commit ourselves to hidden prayer. This hidden prayer happens as we pray for ourselves. Asking God to heal our brokenness and to bring us closer. And it happens as we pray for others when we ask our God to pour out his justice, "for his elect, who cry to him day and night" (Luke 18:6).

As Paul E. Miller writes, "(hidden pray-ers) are the nuclear power plant that fuels so many of the good things we can easily think happened because of good planning or talent."

Now, why am I so focused on prayer right now? Because I am tired. And because I need wind in my sails.

Not only to prepare for our new church year and all the great stuff we are working on. But because of my own involvement in social justice.

That's not big news, I know. But it feels more and more needed and my spiritual gift of prophecy (not foretelling the future, talk to me for definition) is calling me more than ever to real action.

Should I list everything? No need. I work with people with mental illness, addictions, poverty, and homelessness everyday. I see them worrying about losing their health benefits, food stamps, not being able to access housing because rents are enormous and the inventory is incredibly low. Latino friends are afraid to go to public events for they fear to be picked up by masked individuals and put in an unmarked van, sent to who knows where without the due process guaranteed by the Habeas Corpus. LGBTQ+ friends are feeling the hate and discrimination more than ever. Women's rights are going backwards. Books are banned. An entire nation is being eradicated in the Middle East. The enormity of what has been going on sometimes overwhelms me but I refuse to remain silent. So yes, I pray, but I also stand and speak.

We gather. We worship. We pray. We do good works. We give love. We share love. We stand up for each other. It is what we do.

# The Golden Bees: A Ministry of Warmth and Compassion

Each Monday morning, from 9:00 AM to noon, a faithful and spirited group of mostly senior citizens gathers at the Webster Federated Church to serve those in need through the Golden Bees Ministry.



Their mission is simple, yet deeply impactful: to provide warmth, dignity, and

care to the homeless through handmade sleeping bags and personal care kits.

Using donated comforters, blankets, and sheets, the Golden Bees lovingly create sleeping bags that are distributed to homeless shelters, support organizations, and at times, directly to individuals in need. Alongside each sleeping bag, the ministry often includes health kits filled with essential personal care items—another small way to offer comfort and compassion.

The numbers speak volumes. In 2024, the Golden Bees distributed 515 sleeping bags and nearly as many health kits. And in just the first six months of 2025, they've already dis-

tributed over 400 sleeping bags, putting them on track to exceed 800 by year's end. The need is great—and growing—but this dedicated group continues to meet it with grace and generosity.
